This international symposium brings together artists from Manual Cinema, Blind Summit, Stan's Cafe, and others with invited scholars from diverse fields to investigate the meaning, vitality, and relevance of contemporary puppetry. At once cutting to the heart of puppetry and seeking its broadest significance, participants will address questions such as: *How do we attach identity to a face? How do we perceive realness and fakeness? Where do we find meaning in materiality?* Conceived and organized by Blair Thomas (Artistic Director, Chicago International Puppet Theater Festival), Leslie Danzig (Curator, Gray Center for Arts and Inquiry), and Sarah Fornace (Co-Artistic Director, Manual Cinema), this day-long event will be of interest to artists and thinkers from any discipline with an interest in the creative pursuit of inquiry and the tension between ideas and practice.



ELLEN VAN VOLKENBURG

Before 1912, the term "Puppeteer" did not exist in the English language. Ellen van Volkenburg, a director with the Chicago Little Theatre, needed a program credit for the actors she had trained to manipulate marionettes while speaking the text of "A Midsummer's Nights Dream". Van Volkenberg coined this word at the dawn of the movement in puppetry that has brought us to the rich art form that is practiced today. The Chicago International Puppet Theater Festival is a project conceived by

BLAIR THOMAS & COMPNAY.

This is the inaugural Festival.

Blair Thomas founded his company in 2002. Since that time, the company has created and toured more than a dozen original puppet theater productions drawing from literary and musical sources such as Federico Garcia Lorca, Arnold Schoenberg, Wallace Stevens, and Modest Mussorgsky. In the winter of 2016, they will premiere their new adaptation of *Moby Dick*.
